DOUBLE CHAMPIONSHIP CONDITIONS OF COMPETITION

1. Signing Up & Closing Date for Inscriptions

Players may sign up at the office or via the club's homepage startingThursday 09h00 of the week preceding the competition. The number of inscriptions is limited to the quota as defined by the club and inscriptions are handled on a first come, first served basis. Over quota inscriptions are waitlisted.

The closing date and time for competitions is 12h00, two days before start of the competition.

The draw will be posted at the clubhouse and on the club's homepage from 12h00 on the day following the inscription deadline. There will be no changes to starting times once they have been posted. Cancellations will have to strictly comply with paragraph 2.

2. Cancellations, No-shows and No Returns

In case a cancellation is inevitable **and as a courtesy to waitlisted players as well as fellow-competitors part of the same flight**, players must latest by 16h00 the day before the competition inform the office.

Members, who fail to appear for a competition and have not cancelled in accordance with the above procedure, *will see their right to participate in future competitions suspended*.

At the first offence, the player is again made aware of the procedure as outlined in this paragraph.

At the second offence: automatic suspension for the next competition.

At the third offence: automatic suspension for the next 3 competitions. Repeated offences beyond the third offence will be dealt with by committee in view of further sanctions.

No Return of score: Players who fail to complete their round are be subject to handicap adjustment.

3. Check-in and Starting Times

All players must collect their scorecard at the office latest 15 minutes prior to their starting time.

Players should be at their starting point at the latest 5 minutes prior to their starting time.

Players must start at the time established by the committee and must remain throughout the round in the group arranged by the committee. If a player arrives at his starting point, ready to play, within 5 minutes after his starting time, *the penalty for failure to start on time is two strokes at the first hole.*

Penalty for lateness beyond 5 minutes is disqualification.

4. Form of Play and Tees

Form of play: stroke play over 36 holes. Day 1: Four Ball Better Ball. Day 2 Greensome. Competition will be played from the yellow tees for men and the red tees for ladies.

5. Pace Rating and Transportation

The stipulated round must be played in 4 hours and 20 minutes and a maximum time allowance per hole is indicated on each scorecard. In case of slow play the committee or referee may impose a penalty.

Except for senior players (men aged 55 or older, ladies aged 50 or older) and players presenting a specific and recent medical certificate, players must during a stipulated round walk at all times.

Players must walk at all times during the stipulated round (except disabled players or senior players).

6. Discontinuance of Play

Discontinuance of play when not allowed under rule 6.8 will cause disqualification of the player, and suspension of the right to participate in the next competition. The committee will deal with repeated offences.

When play is suspended by committee for a dangerous situation:

if the players in a group are between the play of two holes, they must not resume play until the committee has ordered resumption of play,

if the players are in the process of playing a hole, they must discontinue play immediately and they must not resume play until the committee has ordered resumption of play.

The signal for suspending play due to a dangerous situation will be a prolonged note of a siren. Resume play: two short notes of siren, repeated.

7. Ties

In the event of a tie for first place after 36 holes, a Greensome play-off will be played over 3 holes (holes 16, 17, 18). If there is still a tie after 3-hole play-off, а hole-by-hole play-off will be played, starting at hole the 16. In the event of a tie for the net prices, the method of matching cards will be used. Ties are first to be decided over the last eighteen, the last nine, then the last six, then the last 3 and finally the last hole. If this method does not produce a winner, the winner will be determined by lot

8. Prizes

The title goes to the team with best gross score. Players cannot win both gross and net prizes. In the event of players being eligible for both, the gross prize takes precedence. Prizewinners must be present at the prize giving ceremony in order to receive his prize and all attending must dress for the occasion.

9. Claims, Disputes or Doubtful Points

All competitions are played in accordance with the rules of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews. Local rules apply. The player is responsible for knowing the rules.

Any claims, disputes or doubtful points must be referred to the committee before the competition is deemed to have closed, who refers it to the referee in charge. The referee's decision is final.

A competition is deemed to have closed when the price giving has taken place.

10. Etiquette

Players are requested to observe the rules of etiquette at all times, conduct themselves in a disciplined manner, demonstrating courtesy and sportsmanship. The committee or referee will deal with offences and apply the rules.

If a good reason exists, the committee or the referee in charge of the competition may change above rules.
